

# KINGSLEY: THE STORY OF A CHESHIRE VILLAGE PART 4



A further instalment from the book by William Gibson and Alan Waterworth, published in 1975, but told from a perspective in the 1950s.

At a time when war has again returned to Europe, we can be reminded that Kingsley, like other towns and villages in the UK, was directly affected by the world wars in Europe.

#### **KINGSLEY AT WAR 1939-1945**

Extracts taken from the Village Scrap Book compiled by the Kingsley Women's Institute.

Bomb damage occurred in the village on two nights. A stick of four bombs fell in the area of the Cross, shattering windows at the Horse Shoe Inn, Westminster Bank, the Grocery Store and four cottages. The shippen at Kingsley Hall was also damaged and two cows killed. In the second raid a land-mine was dropped in Beech Lane fields but did not explode and was dealt with by the Bomb Disposal Unit.



Anti-aircraft guns and a searchlight unit were stationed on the high ground at Newton and the RAF men billeted with village families. Thirty barrage balloons, flown to protect ICI at Runcorn and Northwich from low flying aircraft, could be seen from almost any point in the village.



Women's Voluntary Service (WVS) members served hot drinks to village families using the air raid shelters at the Church of England School, during the nights of August and September 1940.

Knitting parties sent hundreds of garments to local servicemen, whilst on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons the WVS opened a gift shop in the village. It also ran a small library and second-hand magazine depot. Before it closed down the shop had raised £608 (c£36000 in today's money) for the Red Cross. It was also used as a centre for distributing cod liver oil and orange juice for children under five years of age. Whist Drives and Auction Sales enabled the Kingsley Men's Institute to send every local serviceman eight pounds (c£480 in today's money).

Food parcels came to the village from Women's Associations in Australia and from Home Makers clubs in the USA. These were divided between WI members and Old Age Pensioners.

#### .....Another war story from the history of Crewood Hall.

The First World War caused many changes: it was very difficult to find staff to run the farm at Crewood Hall. Over time, the farm itself began to take on a neglected appearance, and certainly the land was overrun with rabbits. Any day of the week even a moderate shot could be certain of bringing home a dozen rabbits from an hour's walk over the farm's land.

One of these poachers was Sam Stubbs – a one legged veteran of the Somme who had established squatters' rights over part of the River Board's land at Pickering's Lock. For years he had rowed up and down



the river shooting rabbits, eventually settling at Pickerings and later, much later, establishing a small caravan park on the banks of the Weaver.

Stubbs snared rabbits on Crewood fields regularly during the 1930's but the highlight of his poaching career was one night in 1941. Together with his terrier he left his wooden cabin beside the river and despite the disabilities of an artificial leg clambered up the steep slope of Barren Clough to stake out his nets as he had done so many times before. The night was dark, he placed the nets about six feet or more from the edge of the wood intending then to send his dog to the bottom of the field, thus driving the rabbits into the nets as they ran up hill to the safety of the woods.

Suddenly, the German bombers were overhead dropping flares which lit up the countryside for miles around. There was the shattering crash of bombs falling several miles away and first the flash and then the crunch of anti-aircraft guns. The rabbits were terrified. Soon the nets were alive with struggling half demented rabbits. Stubbs, amazed at his luck, moved swiftly amongst this unexpected harvest expertly dislocating the necks of forty-seven of them before deciding to call a halt.




The very success of the expedition was an embarrassment to him. He gathered together the still warm bodies and then slipping down the slope of Barren Clough and moving stealthily beside the river he returned to his home. There he woke his two daughters and the three of them, whilst it was still dark- pushed a wheelbarrow uphill to the edge of the woods, filled it with the rabbits and then brought their precious load safely back home, unobserved and unsuspected.

It was this same Stubbs who two years earlier in the very first days of the war was sitting at home one winter's evening when there was a knock at the door. It was a young army deserter, not twenty years of age. He lived with his widowed mother at High Leigh, and he certainly didn't want to fight, let alone to die. It was a dramatic moment. There was the Stubbs who had been crippled for life one dreadful day on the Somme, whose body still bore twenty-seven wounds from the horrors of that day; and there too was this frightened lad fleeing from his unit with no place to go. Quickly Stubbs pulled him inside and cooked a meal for him but even as he did so he saw the lock-keeper across the canal hurrying to his telephone hut. The keeper had seen the incident and was ringing for the police.

Shortly afterwards the village constable came cycling down to Stubbs' cabin, but there was no sign of the deserter. Reinforcements combed the area for a day before setting up a checkpoint at Frodsham bridge but still there was no sign of him. Stubbs had told him where to hide, where no one could find hime, in an old poachers' hide-out almost at the head of the deep gully known as Barren Clough. There, for nearly a week, the young lad was safe and each night under cover of darkness he would come down to Stubbs' house, collect the food that the old soldier had put out for him and then slip back to his sanctuary in the woods of Crewood. One morning the food was still there, Stubbs knew that the boy had decided to move on. That same day they caught him at Frodsham bridge.

#### Listen carefully, I shall say this only once...

On a cold wet, blustery Saturday evening in March, The Kingsley and Newton Village Institute was transformed into Café Rene in wartime France. Where the welcome was as warm as the guests' striped jumpers, berets and false moustaches.

The diners, most of whom had donned suitable stereotypical French garb, were treated to an hilarious performance by the Kingsley Players with delicious refreshments to soak up the wine. A few guests found themselves "volunteered" for more audience participation than they had bargained for! The play was certainly familiar to those who remembered the television series back in the 80s and 90s, with all the key characters and catch phrases set in Rene Artois' small café in France during World War Two. While his café doubles as a safe house for British airmen, he also runs covert operations, flirts with his waitresses (although one is somewhat daunting!) while trying to keep his wife and the occupying forces happy. The Players certainly seemed to enjoy themselves as much as the audience, whilst their talent and "professionalism" always shone through.



Allo 'Allo has become a Kingsley tradition that was conceived almost twenty years ago in the Horseshoe Inn, Kingsley. The late Barrie Speed and Malcolm Barker were having lunch with a business associate (a one-time professional actor) when he asked if they would like a script to raise some money for the Kingsley Players. His professional group used to tour a presentation of their version of 'Allo 'Allo. Malcolm and Barrie shared the idea with the Kingsley Players committee who were enthusiastic to present it as an alternative to the annual concert they used to hold in November. Permission to perform was sought and granted by David Croft, one of the two writers of the TV show. He was advised the script would be largely original but would include the characters from the TV show and all the performances would be to raise money for charity. The script was written by Barrie, John Topliss (another Players member) and Malcolm. It was cast and first performed at Kingsley Community Centre in November 2003.

Kingsley Community Centre suffered severe fire damage in 2004 so 'Allo 'Allo sought temporary venues for two performances, one in Frodsham and the other at the Village Institute that year. Two years later the Kingsley Players were back in action at the Community Centre, performing to a full house.

However, by 2009 the team had changed. Neil Silcock had joined the team and took over as director. Neil joined Malcolm in some script revisions and 'Allo 'Allo was performed again at the Kingsley Community Centre to a packed house. In view of the success of the show, it was suggested that the existing show should tour to new venues for new audiences. A successful trial run started at the Tarvin Community Centre, in November of that year.



Following a problem with flooring contractors at the Kingsley Community centre, £6,000 needed to be found to rectify the floor and the "Players" stepped up to the plate to raise the sum by touring further afield with 'Allo 'Allo. In the early years they performed between 6 and 8 shows per year in a variety of venues in Cheshire and surrounding counties. Today, four performances a year continue solely for charity and the proceeds, after costs, are divided between the hosts' charity and Kingsley Community Centre. Crew and actors give their time freely, and enthusiastically to maximise the sums payable to the charities.



The atmosphere in The Kingsley and Newton Village Institute in March this year was most convivial as the hall filled with laughter. As one audience member commented, "This really was a community event. Performed by the community, for the community". If the audience reaction were anything to go by, the demand for "encores" will keep 'Allo 'Allo running for a few more years yet!

Many thanks to The Kingsley Players for a memorable evening and to the members of the Institute who certainly were excellent hosts. Look out for news of further performances in the Autumn!



# ...... that Whit Sunday is the seventh Sunday (50 days) after Easter and is the name used for the Christian festival of Pentecost (Whitsuntide)

It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' disciples after he had ascended into heaven.

Dating back to 1821 in Manchester, local churches or chapels would parade down the street behind huge banners as a walk of Christian witness. They were usually led by children from Sunday Schools and brass bands, which were often linked to brass band competitions, still held in many places on Whit Fridays. Frodsham Silver Band has entered the Saddleworth and District competition and in 2000 were featured there in BBC's "Songs of Praise".

Such walks were held to "encourage community activity without the demon drink and also to keep people away from the temptations of the nearby races held at the same time", as they were held on the Whit Bank Holiday! These were an annual event, particularly in Northwest England, although we believe there has not been one held in Kingsley in living memory. This year's Whit Walk in Manchester is to be held on Monday 29th May starting at the cathedral in Victoria Street heading to Albert Square where there will be a brief Anglican service.




Hello Folks.
