

A rare celestial display featuring Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn will dazzle stargazers during National Astronomy Week 2025, which runs from February 1-9. Complementing the planet parade, the Moon will pass through its phases from crescent to nearly full, creating a spectacular backdrop

For those interested, soon after dark each day (and until about 19.30) four planets are currently visible in the night sky.

Over in the west, and very bright (the next brightest night sky object after the Moon) is Venus.

Just below Venus (quite bright) is Saturn (whose rings are decaying away). It might get too close to the local horizon for some very quickly, so look early after dark if you want to see it.

At the same time, in the southeast, moving towards the south as night progresses, and quite high up in Taurus is Jupiter — the next brightest after Venus.

Finally, more towards the east, in Gemini, you'll find Mars – obvious in its redness.

A basic pair of binoculars will enable you to see the Galilean moons of Jupiter — it's like its own little solar system — and a basic 75mm telescope will give you a glimpse of Jupiter's stripes and Saturn's rings. Make the most of the opportunity to see the rings since they'll be significantly less

KINGSLEY PARISH COUNCIL



The Parish Council met on Tuesday 21st January 2024, at Kingsley Community Centre. There were eight members of the public present, including a representative from United Utilities and OCU the main contractor for the Vyrnwy Aqueduct refurbishment.

Two members of the public expressed concerns about the speeding drivers on Waterloo Lane, and also the inconsiderate parking of cars on the bad bend at the end of the Waterloo Lane straight. The residents were seeking the implementation of the 40mph speed restriction on Waterloo Lane that CWaC have recommended, but as yet, not put in place. One resident raised the state of the private land at the top of Dark Lane formerly used by Factco, who have remove fencing and cabins, but have left large amounts of rubbish in the area. A further two residents raised concerns at the rubbish being left by pedestrians and car drivers on the wooded slope at the top of Top Road / Guest Slack junction. These same residents have offered to lead a litter pick of the area, please see below about a general village litter pick in a few weeks time. Finally, United Utilities and OCU updated the meeting about their progress with the project in the Kingsley area, and have offered to assist in any village projects as way of compensation for any disruption to the village.

January meeting is the time when the Council must agree its budget for the forthcoming financial year April 25 / March 26, and also agree a Precept for the village that will be applied as part of the CWaC Council Tax. Following lengthy debate and discussion, it was agreed a modest year-on-year increase of £3.23 per Band D property. This increase allows the Council to:

- Cover essential ongoing costs, such as playground maintenance and general operational expenses.
- Maintain adequate reserves to handle unexpected expenditure.
- Prepare for key upcoming projects, including the repair and rebuild of the cemetery boundary wall on Hollow Lane, the potential adoption of Middle Lane Playing Field, and a proposed cemetery extension to secure space for future generations.

In the very near future, all households will receive a Parish Council Residents Survey, this has been compiled over the last few months with the aim of giving residents the opportunity to have their say in what priorities they would set for areas of maintenance and potential improvements to village assets. This is NOT a guarantee that the works will be undertaken in the forthcoming financial year as budgets have already been set. Instead, it is hoped that this will aid the Council in prioritising projects, and allowing us to set targeted budgets for the future. It is now abundantly clear that CWaC have abandoned many routine services which the Parish Council is now having to take onboard if we want to maintain our village. With the above in mind, and following on from last year's very successful work days, it has been agreed to have the first of our (hopefully) seasonal work day events. The initial date set for this is 22nd March 2025, with a provisional 9.30 to 12.30pm work period, but there may be an afternoon shift if there is sufficient work remaining. The Parish Council will look once again to have the Community Centre open for toilets and for small refreshments (tea / coffee and biscuits).

As referred to above, we intend to now incorporate into the work days a "Village Litter Pick" for those less able to wield tools and undertake the heavier works. The Parish Council has obtained some work tools to help the tidy up, and we are seeking to obtain from CWaC, litter grabbers, hoops and bags for the litter picker teams. If anyone is aware of the whereabouts of the original litter picking equipment from the previous groups who did this work, could they please contact the Parish Clerk and we will aim to get this equipment as well. Let 2025 be the year we transform Kingsley and once more show our pride in this wonderful village of ours. Please look at the village Facebook page for updates on this work day.

As many of our residents who regularly walk the playing field tarmac path will have noticed, there is a significant depression developed at the top end near the basketball area. We believe this is due to subsidence caused by an underground stream.

We are looking to get this repaired when weather conditions permit. We have also been in discussions with regards to the Wild Flower meadows and the poor show last year. It appears that these areas have become very waterlogged and we are seeking advice how best to overcome this. As a consequence there may not be a wild flower meadow this year.



...... that Jesus was a real person? And what's more – he was a refugee!! The idea for this article came to me firstly when I saw on the television the other day a 'celebrity' who had been educated at Eton admit that he thought Jesus was simply a myth and hadn't existed.

Then at the Hurst on Sunday the local preacher focused on Jesus' family and their refugee status. This is a HUGE subject of course!

Firstly, was Jesus a real person?

The first-century Roman Tacitus who is considered one of the more accurate historians of the ancient world, mentioned superstitious "Christians" (from Christus, which is Latin for Christ), who suffered under Pontius Pilate during the reign of Tiberius.

Suetonius, chief secretary to Emperor Hadrian, wrote that there was a man named Chrestus (or Christ) who lived during the first century (Annals 15.44).

Flavius Josephus is the most famous Roman-Jewish historian. In his Antiquities he refers to James, "the brother of Jesus, who was called Christ." There is a controversial verse (18:3) that says, "Now there was about this time Jesus, a wise man, if it be lawful to call him a man. For he was one who wrought surprising feats....He was [the] Christ...he appeared to them alive again the third day, as the divine prophets had foretold these and ten thousand other wonderful things concerning him." One version reads, "At this time there was a wise man named Jesus. His conduct was good and [he] was known to be virtuous. And many people from among the Jews and the other nations became his disciples. Pilate condemned him to be crucified and to die. But those who became his disciples did not abandon his discipleship. They reported that he had appeared to them three days after his crucifixion, and that he was alive, accordingly he was perhaps the Messiah, concerning whom the prophets have recounted wonders."

None of these historians was Christian, therefore their reporting can be considered unbiased.

Secondly, how do we explain his refugee status?

Well, Jesus's parents, Mary and Joseph, had to go to Bethlehem to be counted in a population census. Jesus was born there, and as his parents were about to return to their home in Nazareth, King Herod announced that every first-born son in Bethlehem should be killed. (He had been led to believe that a child who had been born in Bethlehem would one day be King, and he feared for his own position.) As with present refugees living under a tyrannical regime, they feared for their lives and fled to Egypt!

During his life, Jesus was considered as a radical and extremist by the authorities of his time, but we now find that over 2 billion people worldwide believe in and worship him!

Last month I spotted a snowdrop. A brave green shoot, already with milky white petals. Years ago snowdrops were called Candlemas Bells, as they bloom in our part of the world around 2nd February when we celebrate Candlemas. Snowdrops symbolise all sorts of things, from purity to the Holy Trinity – not bad for a tiny flower!

They also symbolise hope. While the days are lengthening now, the darkness of winter persists and Spring can seem far away. Catching sight of a snowdrop refreshes our hope that Spring will come.

We need signs of hope. Even if life is going smoothly (and who enjoys that luxury for long?!), when we hear news about the wider world, darkness can threaten to overwhelm us. We can feel powerless in the face of developments beyond our control or understanding.

Long ago a man called Simeon had been faithfully waiting for a sign of hope. The story goes that when Mary and Joseph brought their baby son Jesus to the temple, at Candlemas, Simeon saw in the child the "Messiah", the promised hope for the world to become a better place, more like the kingdom of God on earth. Hope, it turned out, lay not in a self-confident hero offering simple solutions and 'right/wrong' answers to the world's problems, but in a helpless baby born into a modest family in relative obscurity. A reminder of our shared vulnerability and mutual dependence. Of our need to learn to love our neighbour as ourself.

Simeon – and Luke, who told the story – recognised the baby Jesus Christ as a sign of hope. Of God revealed in the world; bringing light into darkness. Whether you own this belief or not, there is little doubt that being alert to signs of fresh life and hope, smiling when we recognise them, and at the end of each day, giving thanks for them, lifts our spirits, and the spirits of those who see and maybe return our smile. Like the snowdrop, in a tiny way, making the world just a little bit better.

What signs of hope will you find and share this month?
