BOOK CLUB



The Kingsley Book Club met in March to discuss our thoughts on 'The Young Accomplice' by Benjamin Wood.

The 4th novel by award winning Benjamin Wood set in the 1950's with flashbacks to the 30's two young siblings get the chance to join an architect couple as apprentices. They live and work together on the Surrey farm where the Mayhoods' idealistic practice is based: tilling lessons in the morning; draughting classes in the afternoon. A happy time is had for a while, until Joyce's dark past follows her.

A very atmospheric book we were soon all in the 1950's with the rolling countryside and a simpler life. A quick and easy read opened multiple discussions ranging from the idealistic 'belief & opportunity', Nature vs. nurture, the restrictions for women in the 1950's, how borstal worked for males and not females to the impact of war.

The main character Joyce split opinion with a lively debate on if she was a damaged, fragile young woman that needed more than the limited 1950's could offer women or a self centred lying manipulative young woman who made multiple wrong choices in her life. The book highlighted beautifully how the siblings coped differently with their early tragedy. Although our love/hate of Joyce did give us a good subject we all agreed the other 3 main characters added multiple layers to the story each having to cope with what life had thrown at them.

After a lively debate it was good to finish in agreement that even with the disappointing end we highly recommend this book each giving a high score.

At our next meeting* on the 11th April we will be discussing 'Trust' by Herman Diaz.

AN ADVENTURE ACROSS THE ATLANTIC



I have recently competed the first Leg of The Clipper Round the World Sailing Challenge that began in late August 2023. An Atlantic Crossing from Portsmouth to Uruguay, over 7,250 nautical miles in 40 days.

The event is a record-breaking 40,000 nautical mile race around the world on 70-foot ocean racing yachts over 11 months. The route is divided into eight legs and between 13 and 16 individual races including six ocean crossings. You can choose to complete the full circumnavigation (if you're mad enough) or select single legs (for the only slightly less mad).

The brainchild of Sir Robin Knox-Johnston, the first person to sail solo non-stop around the world, the first Clipper Race took place in 1996. Since then, almost 6,000 Race Crew from all walks of life and more than 60 nations have trained and raced in the Clipper Round the World Yacht Race; the only race in the world where the organisers supply a fleet of identical racing yachts (eleven), each with a fully qualified skipper and first mate to safely guide the mixed experience crew.

My journey started in 2014 when I saw a poster advertising the event, but it took me seven years to sign up. The decision was not taken lightly especially as I had limited sailing experience, but I needed a challenge. I didn't realise at the time how challenged I would be physically and mentally.

The pre-race experience included four weeks of intense training and assessment on the water in the Solent & English Channel, learning to tie knots and bake bread (essential skills trust me).

Reality came round very quickly and sailing out of Portsmouth harbour at the start of the race was surreal. A mixed bag of emotions with the festival atmosphere, the crowds of well-wishers and families waving all 11 boats off on Leg 1. I was assigned to the UNICEF sponsored boat which was nicknamed the big blue.

Our UNICEF boat had a crew of twenty from eight countries split into two watches. We were expected to participate in all the tasks on board from helming, changing sails, mother watch, maintenance, repairs, engineer to navigation and the rest. Some of people were more suited to certain tasks and as we got to know each other we became more efficient working together. But I have to admit there were occasions where it was "all hands-on deck", just getting on with it.

One of the biggest hurdles to face was the lack of sleep and recuperation, averaging a maximum of 3-4 hours a day and often interrupted.



Leg 1 involved two ocean races. The first race was from Portsmouth to Cadiz in southern Spain. We had an uneventful start to the race through the English Channel before we entered the Bay of Biscay where we were greeted by a deep low-pressure system, biblical seas, and storm force winds. Most of the crew were battered, bruised and seasick. To say it was challenging was an understatement. The general conversation was "why are we doing this? I'm going to get off at the first stop". Strangely however, after 5 days rest in Cadiz with great hospitality we were all eager to go again.

The second race involved sailing from Cadiz to Uruguay, down the West Coast of Africa, routing towards the Canaries and Cape Verde, across the Altantic and down the east coast of South America.

As we headed south, the weather became warmer, and the Trade Winds carried us southwards with warm sun, constant breeze and long days with the spinnaker flying; and speeds of up to thirty knots. It was almost a pleasant experience while it lasted......
Unfortunately, up ahead less clement conditions awaited us.

The dreaded Doldrums with fickle wind holes, seas like glass and then sudden squalls. Turbulent winds and rain coming through every day combined with intense temperatures. What a roller coaster, we didn't know what to expect next. The boat and the crew experienced massive highs and lows literally, at some points temperature below deck hung around the 50 o C mark.

As we crossed the Equator to appease King Neptune (an old seafaring tradition) we held a celebratory ceremony on board. Non-alcoholic beverages, cakes and crew members acting out roles in costumes/wigs was a much need light relief as we from the Northern to the Southern Hemisphere.

Throughout the trip the wildlife was spectacular. Flying fish and schools of dolphins, followed the boat daily, along with close sightings of whales. The variety of seabirds was amazing. Some nights the sky was jaw dropping, immense and spectacular, beyond words or photos.

After 31 days at sea experiencing the vastness of the oceans without sight of land, we arrived in Punta del Este in Uruguay, the Miami of South America. Exhausted but elated we were treated to a fantastic Latin welcome. This was followed by spectacular events and parties put on by the local yacht club over a week of R&R. A great end to a great adventure for me.

I was sad to leave the boat and I will cherish all the friendships I have made. As I reflect on the whole experience, the ups and downs literally I am so glad I challenged myself.

The realisation that the ocean does not distinguish between an experienced or novice sailor, there is nowhere to hide, and it does not matter how well you think you are prepared for a race like this; things happen. During the sail south, several of the crew were injured or were taken ill. The boat was also damaged and at times we lost the use of vital equipment, and navigation instruments. How we handled these events was very much part of the journey for me.

I continue to support the boat as it sails around the world through WhatsApp groups, the Big Blue web site and Clipper Race Viewer. During April the fleet will be tackling the Mighty 8000-mile Pacific crossing from China to Seattle which is promised to be a daunting race and I wish them all the luck for safe passage.

Two Bowls of Water

Jesus is risen! He is risen indeed!

Words of joy proclaimed across the world on Easter Sunday as we remember and celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

In the story of Jesus last few days prior to his crucifixion and resurrection, there are two bowls of water. One is used by Pilate to 'wash his hands of Jesus', absolving himself of all responsibility for Jesus' crucifixion even though, deep down, he appeared to know that it wasn't the right thing to do. If you haven't read the story for a while, it's worth looking up. You'll find it in Matthew chapter 27. It has echoes of the power politics that trouble politicians today.

The other bowl, in an incident that proved somewhat puzzling to his followers, Jesus knelt on the floor and began, despite their protestations, to wash his disciples' feet.In response to their unease at what he was doing, he simply said, "If I don't wash you, you can't be part of what I'm doing." We sometimes refer to Jesus as the Servant King, and servanthood and love are the essence of this simple act.

The two bowls are always before us in life. The one where ignore or even shun people whom we see as different or somehow 'unworthy'. We literally and figuratively wash our hands of them.

The other bowl is one where with love we serve the needs of others. We do this in many different ways. In the care and generosity we show to neighbours, friends and sometimes to strangers whose paths cross ours. A sacrificial love where we give of ourselves and expect nothing in return.

Easter invites us to remember Jesus, his story and all he teaches about how to live and to relate to one another with kindness and in love. He entrusts to us the future of our communities, locally, nationally and globally.

When in the Upper Room, just before his arrest, trial and crucifixion, Jesus washed people's feet. Feet dirty from walking along dusty roads barefoot. A simple but meaningful act. And simple and meaningful then as now. An act of service. And that is what he calls us to do too. To serve others. To be there for others. To show love to others.

Two bowls of water. One of absolution of responsibility, one of love.

Goosebumps and Country Jumps



The Kingsley Walkers have been out again over the past few weeks. On February 27th we headed out to park at the old Hadlow Road station, closed in 1956, along with the Hooton to West Kirby branch of the Birkenhead Railway. It has now been restored as a museum by volunteers. There was a prominent old sign advertising Bovril but unfortunately none was available to warm us on a very cold day that stayed pretty dry despite the forecast.

The 9 mile walk started on the Wirral Way, following the old track bed. We left that at Neston cutting down to the bank of the Dee Estuary and stopping for our pack lunch at Parkgate. The cold wind sparked comments about brass monkeys. The lively conversation which is a feature of the group, suggested this was nothing to do with the appendages of male primates but referred to the practice of storing cannon ammunition on a dimpled brass plate (known as a monkey) on the decks of warships, in the age of sail. When very cold the brass contracted, pushing out the iron cannon shot. Later, in depth research on Google, revealed this also to be b@lls.

Further historical discussion recounted that nearby was the birthplace of Emma Hamilton. Sat as we were at a place labelled as the 'Donkey Stand' a venerable member of the group recalled Parkgate's heyday as a resort and remembered seeing the tide coming in to lap at the minimalist sea wall.

After lunch there were some route diversions due to 'work' - in reality invisible workers and stationary diggers, behind temporary fences. Pictures are available on the Kingsley Walkers Facebook Page of our tender negotiation of the resultant muddy stretches but also of the smiles that are another feature of our walks. Appreciation to John for leading the walk, Steve for putting the photos online and Linda for her bags of sweetness and sweeties.

On March 5th, 16 walkers set off from Egg Bridge in Waverton encouraged on by a sunny morning, naysaying a miserable forecast. Walking along the Shropshire Union canal another venerable group member (possibly an eyewitness) mentioned the nearby site of the Civil War Battle of Rowton Moor.

I didn't know that steeplechasing is so called because the gentry used to bet on cross-country horse races between churches. It is said that the odd, pyramid shaped, steeples of St James' in Christleton and St Peter's in Waverton were added to the existing towers by the Duke of Westminster to assist his direction finding in the saddle.

The walk passed various points of interest such as a former clay pit which is now a pleasant lake, a village pump and some picturesque almshouses. At the end of our own 5 miles cross country we galloped into The Cheshire Cat pub for a very enjoyable lunch.

... that the Methodist Chapel on The Hurst, built in 1871, is the third on this site

and that the one before it, built in 1818, was attached to the adjacent house now known as the 'Old Bakery'.


There is written evidence for this and when, 10 years ago, alterations to the front of the chapel were in progress, some existing foundations were discovered which aligned with the house...those foundations now lie buried under the ramped access to the chapel. Roughly, the 1818 building was L shaped with the short leg of the L facing the road. The long leg of the L is named, on a plan, as a school building: the implication being, maybe, that it was not used only on Sundays!

The cost of the Chapel is uncertain but the figure of £129 was paid to a Joseph Oultram; £80 was borrowed from an unnamed source; £68 from donations and collections is also recorded. These amounts are close to records of minutes in Runcorn Methodist Circuit documents of £300.

The 1818 Chapel was said to be on a 1,000 year lease!

In 1851 regular Sunday attendances at the Hurst were c. 68 congregation in the mornings and 75 in the afternoons – 38 for the morning Sunday school sessions and 30 for the afternoon ones.


